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## **USEFUL REMINDERS**



- ★ Think through every level of your existing environment, through the lens of the new standards of hygiene.
- ★ Consider how the physical environment will be shaped and designed to encourage new behaviours.
- ★ Be clear with your team regarding all policies and procedures with respect to hygiene in your setting.
- ★ Inform parents about these new standards of hygiene and send information home, if possible, prior to reopening so that the standards are replicated in the home environment.
- ★ Create areas for hand hygiene at a convenient height for the children in your setting, providing cues /signs is helpful.
- In order to keep everyone safe and as mindsets are changing, It is very important that everyone is in agreement, with all new policies and processes.





# THE CHILDREN



onnecting with children calmly and intentionally will be important. Aim to reduce any anxiety in the classroom. Fun hygiene routines will help with this.

- ★Be proactive with your language. e.g. smile and say something like "Oops lets remember to keep those busy hands sparkling clean"; rather than "wash your hands!"
- $\bigstar$  Use simple explanations.
- ★Use books, rhymes, songs, video about preventing the spread of germs.
- Remember there's no need to overdo it. Rather, normalise routines around hand hygiene.
- ★ Do remind the children, until the process is in place.
  Remember, children are likely to remind each other!
- ★ Be clear with children (and parents) about what to do if anyone is unwell.

emember to check in with the children's physical, and emotional well-being.
